|                    |  |                                 | The appointments system means that residents no longer<br>face long queues on the Greenford road and peak times, so<br>the site is safer. Council staff are also able to assist residents<br>to divert more waste from landfill.   |
|                    |  |                                 | The appointments system has also demonstrated that there<br>are certain times and days of the week when the centre is no<br>at all well-used, and therefore the council is looking into<br>focusing our resources on the days which are most popular<br>with residents (including weekends). On days where site<br>access will no longer be available at Greenford, partner<br>boroughs across West London will allow access for Ealing<br>residents in a reciprocal arrangements. |

Please break down by Victoria Hall<br>Trust revenue and LBE revenue.   | Ed Axe, Emily<br>Hill | As the recent Tribunal judgement makes clear, the purpose<br>of the Victoria Hall Trust is to make rooms available to the<br>public for their use at affordable rates.<br>While the Town Hall is closed for health and safety reasons,<br>the council is relocating that function to the ground floor of<br>Perceval House, with rooms available for the public and<br>community organisations to book.<br>Currently, the closure of the Town Hall is creating a financial<br>gap of c. £95,250, though we expect this to be made up (in<br>full or in part) by bookings within Perceval House and other<br>council venues.<br>The breakdown in usage of Victoria Trust and LBE revenue<br>is not available as a reconciliation is undertaken at year-end. |  |  |  |  |  |  |

The subsequent report<br/>stated that aspects of the fire safety arrangements were<br/>lacking and that fire compartmentalisation was breached in<br/>several locations.</li> <li>As a result, the council's Head of Fire Safety reviewed the<br/>fire escape routes for the building in March 2023.</li> <li>A more detailed building fabric survey was then<br/>commissioned, which was undertaken in May 2023.
